

# Juglans Tolerant Plants to grow under Black Walnut

Black Walnuts and other trees in the walnut family emit a chemical called 'juglans' into the soil, which can limit the growth of other species near by. Juglans remains in the soil even after the tree is cut down. Many of the plants listed here are reportedly resistant to Juglans. Your experience may vary.
